that slotted together like a jigsaw puzzle. Designer Cicero Moraes, said: "Freddy was the first tortoise in the world to receive a fully rebuilt hull." The vets have since built beaks for three toucans, a parrot, and a goose, and the first ever titanium prosthetic pecker for a macaw.

After sunshine and showers this weekend, temperatures will start rising on Tuesday, hitting 30C in some places by holiday Monday. It could make this May the warmest in 168 years. And Ladbrokes have slashed the

odds on the summer of 2016 being the hottest ever to just 2/1. May has been a month of two halves, from cold, wet and windy to warm and sunny. The warmest day of the year was on May 8, when temperatures rose to 26C in some areas. The average temperature for the

month so far is 13C, but a heat-wave could push that past the previous high of 13.9C in 1848. James Madden, of Exacta Weather, said: "Despite a much fresher and slightly more unsettled outlook in the coming days, there is now agreement that high pressure will never be too far away for

the remainder of May." He forecast "high pressure and warm to hot temperatures throughout". And he said it could make this May "the warmest in 168 years". Nicola Maxey at the Met Office predicted that June would have average or slightly above average temperatures, particularly away from the east coast. ■ India has recorded its hottest-ever temperature of 51C. nicola.bartlett@trinitymirror.com

## Names of the 96 tattooed on fan's back

LIVERPOOL fan Jason Edwards has had the names of the 96 supporters who died at Hillsborough tattooed on his back. The lifelong Reds fan decided on the tribute at the end of the two-year inquest in which jurors returned verdicts of unlawful killing. The tattoo, Jason's first, took four-and-a-half hours to complete and cost £160. Dad-of-two Jason, 15 at the time of Liverpool's FA Cup tragedy in April 1989, said: "Those who died must never be forgotten." Jason, 42, of Deighton, West Yorks, whose family is from Liverpool, has the club crest at the centre with the 96 names down either side. By the crest are the names of his son Ciaran, 15, and daughter Lily, 13, in Thai symbols with the slogan: "My kids will never walk alone."

## Seizure kills new mother after 7 days

A TRAGIC mum has died of a seizure just seven days after the birth of her long-awaited daughter. Amy Poole, who had heartbreak six years ago when son Michael, three, died after a house fire, was overjoyed when Lainey was born weighing 5lb. But a week later Amy, 28, was found gasping for breath by partner Kevin Hall, 34. He took her to hospital but her heart stopped and doctors could not save her. He said: "She had some sort of seizure. "They must have been working for an hour, trying to get her heart working again, but they couldn't. Everything went through my mind. Amy was my world." Amy, who also had sons Jeramia, 11, and Archie, seven, was "so pleased we finally had a little girl", said Kevin, of Hull.
